The Results Are In!

CNA's Survey on the Pilot Call-in Bulk Pick Up Program

From April through December of last year, instead of the regular neighborhood wide bulk pick ups that occur about 6 months apart, customers were instructed to call 311 to arrange up to three bulk pickups if they desired. During the month of December, CNA conducted a survey to find out what people's thoughts were regarding the city's pilot call-in only bulk pickups. 45 people answered all or part of the sixteen-question survey.

The conclusions that can be drawn from the results are that most of the responders did not prefer the pilot to the traditional neighborhood wide pickups. While they did not mind some level of a call-in option, they did not for the most part want to replace the neighborhood wide pickups with a call-in program entirely.

Most of the responders (89%) were aware that the pilot was in effect. 58% of them did not use the pilot. The reasons given included they didn't have a need to use it, they kept forgetting to call, it seemed like too much of a hassle, they didn't know about the program, they didn't know how it worked, or they didn't have enough items.

The 19 individuals who used the program indicated that once a time for pick up had been set with the city, they had to wait anywhere from a day to a couple of weeks for the pick up, with most people falling into the 2 days to a week time frame. 89% said the trucks arrived the day they said they would. Arranging the collection time was not always considered easily done. While about 2/3 of the responders who used the



program ($\overline{68\%}$) indicated they had no problems with the pilot, the other 1/3 had some level of difficulty. These mostly revolved around problems getting call backs from the city to schedule a day after placing their initial call to 311, having to play phone tag, trucks not arriving on the scheduled day, or not having enough items for a pick up.

When these users were asked how convenient the pilot program was compared to the neighborhood wide pickups, 52% felt it was not as convenient, 33% felt it was more so, and 15% thought it was about the same.

A few of the questions tried to address possible concerns that neighbors and recyclers who drive the neighborhood do not have the same opportunity to salvage items before they go to the landfill because of a lack of notice. 77% of the responders felt the pilot did not allow the same chance, and 58% felt more items probably went into the landfill as a result.

Survey takers were asked to rank seven options that described how they would set up the city's bulk collection program. Three options were some form of call-in only, two were forms of combination call-in and traditional neighborhood wide collections, 1 was the traditional program, and 1 option allowed responders to See Survey, continued on page 2

include their own ideas. People were also allowed to mark any choices that they found unacceptable. After the survey platform scored the results, the two most popular choices (with nearly identical scores) were the combination call-in/traditional programs. This was followed by the traditional 6-month apart neighborhood pickups. The three call-in only options came next in popularity.

When people were asked if they preferred the pilot to the traditional twiceyearly neighborhood wide collections, 79% of the responses were "No".

The final open-ended question allowed responders to express any thoughts, comments or suggestions they had about the city's pilot bulk pick up program. About 2/3 of the comments were generally negative. These comments included a preference for the traditional pickups because it works fine, people felt guilty for calling out a truck to pick up one or two items, it was more motivating to have a set deadline to clean out the garage or house, and people enjoyed the "neighborhood event" aspect of the traditional pickups. Some felt the call-in pilot was inefficient and probably more costly. Others found it more of a hassle than the traditional pick-ups.

The remaining responses of a neutral or positive nature included suggestions that call-ins be an addition, not a replacement of the neighborhood wide collections and that call-ins allowed for more flexibility and convenience for the customer.

A further analysis of the responses by the users only of the program to the rankings question and the question of whether or not there was a preference for the pilot over the neighborhood wide pickups seemed in order to see how they compared to the overall responses. 77% of the users of the pilot who responded still preferred a combination program over a call-in only program. While the percentage of people who did like the pilot over the traditional pickups was greater among pilot users, still over half (58%) did not prefer the pilot.

Thank you to those people who took the time to take the survey. Understandably, the results of CNA's survey have been condensed for this article. The city plans to do its own survey sometime in the future, so be sure to share your thoughts when they do.

Note: As the newsletter goes to press, no neighborhood wide bulk pickup for Crestview has been scheduled for 2019. A call to Austin Resource Recovery revealed that "until further notice" all collections will be call-in only.

The Real Estate Council will likely try again to strike down our tree ordinance. The hotel lobbyists (and mayor) could try to make it harder to spend hotel occupancy tax (HOT) money on anything but convention center expansion instead of parks, small venues and other uses throughout the city. The service is free for individuals and families who make less than \$55,000 annually; income eligibility increases by \$5,000 for each additional person for families with more than four members.
