## Q & A With District 7 Runoff Candidates

With none of the seven candidates running for the District 7 Councilmember's position on the City Council winning over 50% of the vote in the November general election, the top two vote getters, Gary Bledsoe and Mike Siegel, will be facing off in the December runoff election.

Crestview and Brentwood Neighborhood Associations will be jointly hosting a Q & A session to give residents an opportunity to ask questions about the issues that are most important to them.

When: Tuesday, December 3, 2024 from 6:30 to 7:30 pm Where: Episcopal Church of the Resurrection Parish Hall 2008 Justin Ln.

While both candidates share many of the same goals, their approach to accomplish those goals will be very different. The candidate who wins the D7 runoff will play a pivotal role in the decisions made by the incoming council, not only having an impact on citywide policies but also playing a critical role in determining the future of neighborhoods that fall within district 7, especially with respect to land use.

**Election day** is Saturday, December 14. **Early voting** runs from Monday, December 2 – Tuesday, December 10.

## Austin Discontinues Citywide Twice Yearly Bulk and Brush Collection

Austin Resource Recovery (ARR) is changing how it offers bulk and brush collections to residential customers. Beginning in January 2025, the collections will no longer be made twice yearly but will convert to an on-demand



service only. (Crestview was already switched to on-demand for bulk waste pick-up several years ago.) On-demand household hazardous (HHW) colwaste lection will also be launched citywide in January. Each service address will be able to schedule up to three collections per service every calendar year.

Collections will then reset at the beginning of the next year.

ARR customers will be notified by mail and via the Austin Recycles app when they can begin scheduling appointments for these collections. Once available, appointments can be made by downloading the Austin Recycles app, visiting AustinTexas.gov/MySchedule or calling Austin 3-1-1 (512-974-2000). The scheduling system will list which items or materials can be collected and customers will identify what they plan to set out. Customers will get an email confirmation after an appointment is made and a follow-up email prior to their appointment as a reminder to set out items. Crews will then collect the items on the scheduled day. Collections will not be made without an appointment.

In an Instagram post, the shop stated that they would be reopening with reduced hours. The business will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Monday-Friday and 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Additionally, the coffee shop has needed to increase their prices and will no longer be serving breakfast tacos due to the need for the business to cut back on stock. The post also stated that there would be more news to come regarding the demolition and the new location.

There's only one word in the dictionary that's spelled wrong. What is it?


The word "wrong." It's the only word that's spelled W-R-O-N-G.

## **Building Taller & Limiting Your Drip**

(Editor's Note: As we go to press, these items are on the agenda, and the final votes by council are unknown.)

The City Council continues to "reimagine" Austin with ▲ items on the November 21 City Council agenda.

#### **Limiting Drip Irrigation**

You may use drip irrigation in your garden because of its ability to conserve water and efficiency over conventional

sprinklers. The city has noticed that, though, and it is introducing a new ordinance (Item 6) to restrict the use of drip irrigation in your vard at the same level as conventional sprinklers. Remember that the City's water system leaks 6.9 billion gallons of water per year – enough to fill 12,000 Olympic-sized swimming pools.

#### Huge Bonuses for Housing in **Industrial Zones**

The Council is also considering an ordinance (Item 81) to create a new district, PDA 2, that will apply to industrial areas and near highways, including a density bonus program DB240 (Item 82) to go with it, allowing residential development.

This bonus would allow up to 240 feet of height. A letter from UT researchers says: "...But the DB240 proposal before you actually adds residential uses to an area currently zoned for high intensity uses, including uses that spew pollutants known to endanger people living nearby into the air. And I understand that current uses would be grandfathered."

#### More DB90 Giveaways

Additional DB-90 upzoning is being considered in East Austin along 2nd (item87) and 5th (Item 89) Street and East 38 1/2 Street (Item 94) in Cherrywood, where 74 existing

affordable housing units would be slated for demolition, withseveral others in the lineup on West 24th (Item 111), Vargas Road (Item 85) and Willow Creek (Item 96).

#### Should Hotel use Satisfy Residential Requirements in Density Bonuses?

In the flurry of upzonings all across the city that is incompatible with the surrounding or nearby neighborhoods - the city council has adopted a whole new definition

of affordable housing. (Item 112) In a case involving a small lot on West 5th Street, they have decided that "hotel use" can substitute for multi-family housing – in requesting to double the allowed height from 60 to 120 feet.
















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
